The children have since enjoyed an excellent environment to live in. The last room on the first floor which was being used as storage was cleaned out and refurbished into a study room.

After commissioning the Study Room the children and all guests assembled upstairs on the terrace. The children presented 3 poems. They started with "When you are happy – clap your hands". They then recited a poem on "Environmental Preservation" and finally on "Drug Abuse". Their performance was par excellence and applauded by all present as seen below.



This was followed by formal speeches. Mr. Mark Kayanda gave a brief on the Home, The Sirio School, Tumaini Out-patient Clinic and Tazama Vocational Centre. He stressed on the diligence of the staff and the care they provide to the children which has made a significant difference to the lives of the children. Rotarian Jayne Githere gave a brief of the project having received US\$ 1,720 from Rotary Foundation District 9212 Grant. The Club added US\$ 500 to help purchase all the items. Also donated were 100 packs of Sanitary Towels for senior girls which should be sufficient for a year. The girls were later given a lecture on its usage and care. Many more items were donated including a TV, Video and DVD from Dr. Sur's family for use in the dormitory for younger children with a play area created for them.
